

Guys 'N' Dolls 9th - 13th April 2013 Directed by Amanda Campbell, Musical Director Linda Coombes

Greeted by General Cartwright (Brenda Slaughter), the pre-show included tour guides, ice cream sellers, Salvation Army, Mindy's Cheesecake and hot dogs to boot! Complementing this a band of streetwise gamblers "shooting craps" welcomed the audience to the streets of New York. Hilltop really does excel in creating a first class atmosphere from the minute you walk through the door.

Guys and Dolls is a huge undertaking for any company, and the limitations of the stage did hinder somewhat the flow, pace and execution of this production. That being said, James Randell was in fine form as Sky and was beautifully matched by Rhiannon Owen who gave us a very believable Sarah Brown. Rhiannon has a great voice and the duet 'I've Never Been In Love Before' was very well executed. Tim Driscoll's portrayal of Nathan was the best I have seen, sung and delivered with panache while continually eluding the eager intentions of Miss Adelaide played by Angie Dymott.

With so many supporting actors that are key to the show's success, I feel I must single out two in particular. Phil Davies as Arvide was perfectly cast in the role, delivering 'More I Cannot Wish You', beautifully, with an element of paternal comedy, well played. Mike Beavan as Nicely Nicely Johnson was outstanding, eating his way through the show and delivering the performance of the night in the number 'Sit Down Your Rocking the Boat'. A keen orchestra under the guidance of Linda Coombes and some innovative lighting kept the show moving along. Looking forward to Calendar Girls in June. Well done and thank you for the invite.

This was not my first visit to Hilltop; however it was my first as the area NODA representative having been handed the baton from the legend and true gentleman that is Frank Wooles.

"Vicar of Dibley"! At Hilltop? no no no YES!......I loved the television series, and was a little sceptical as to its ability to transfer to the stage, I was pleasantly suprised. The Christmas festivities began tonight, with the villagers and chorus under the keen eye of the multi talented Linda Coombes.

In total 36 scenes were enacted, however the decision to mask 50% of the available stage area for the majority of the show gave director (Rhys Stapleton), and stage crew many headaches causing transitional delays between scenes.

There was no doubt that Huw Williams was David Horton with familiar characterisations from Richard Jones (Hugo), Sian Williams (Geraldine) and Steve Williams' first class Frank Pickle, which would have fitted seamlessly into the TV series. Great support from Martyn Lench (Owen), Dai Williams (Jim) and Brenda Slaughter as Letitia, however Helen Page as Alice Tinker was simply perfect. Well done, an outstanding performance.
